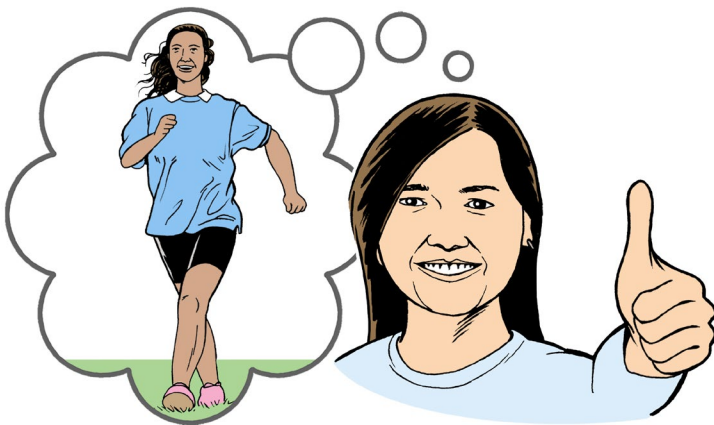




About this easy read booklet

Exercise



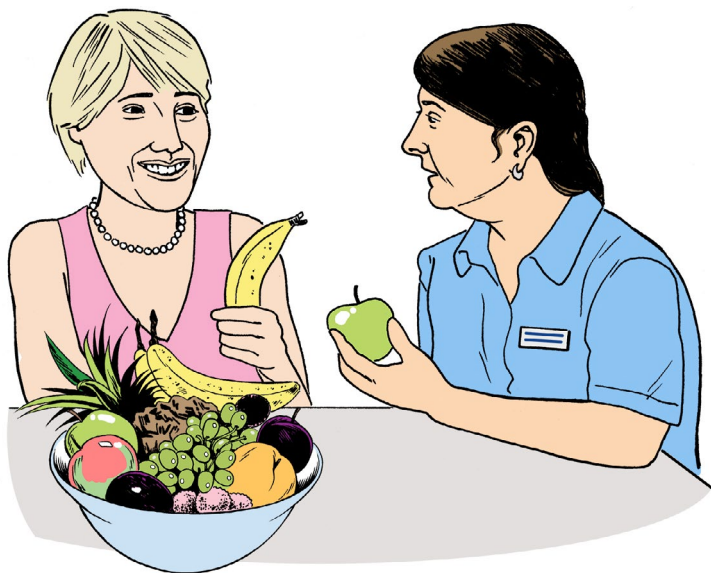
You can make changes to your life that may make you less likely to get cancer.

If you are overweight, you are more likely to get cancer.



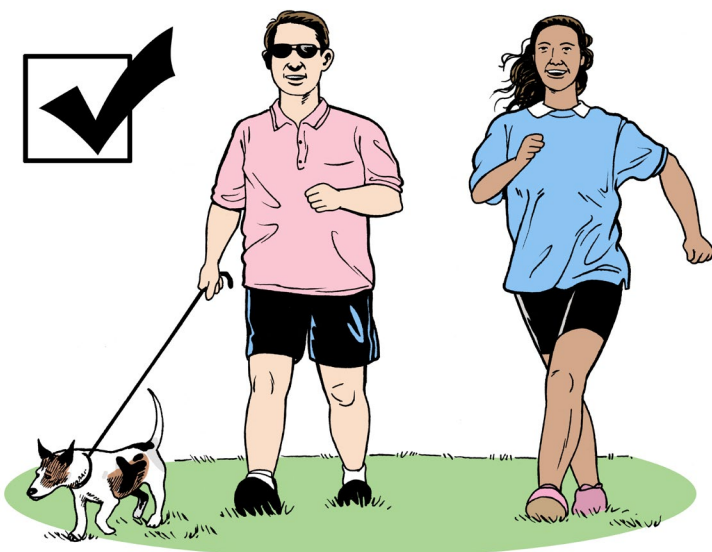
You may need to eat less or change what you eat. You can read more about healthy eating in our booklet **Eat a healthy diet.**

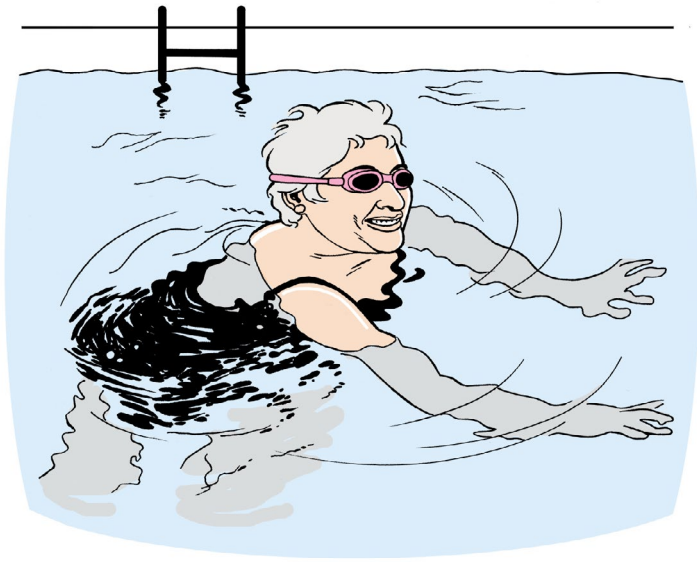


It is important to exercise to keep your body healthy.

- yoga



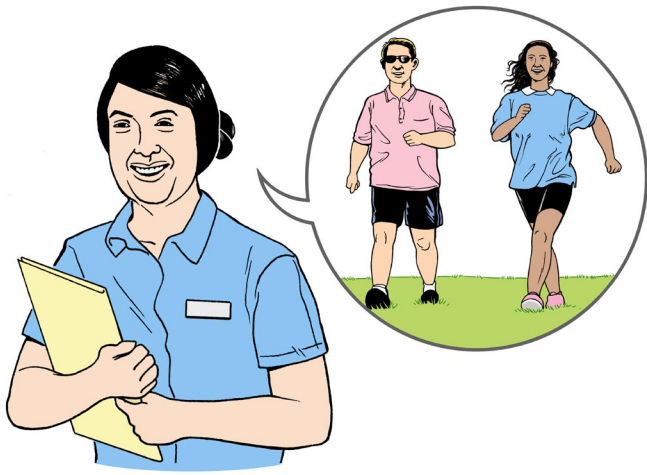
- playing sports.

Your doctor can tell you about people who can help. Talk to your doctor if you need any more information about exercise.

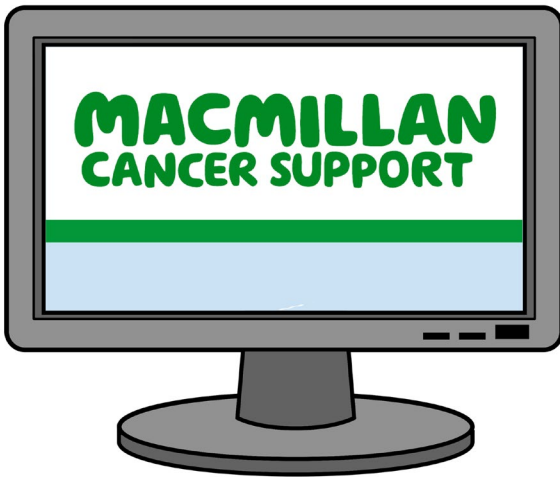
